## Hearing from you during the recent Holidays!

The Alumni Association was very pleased to hear from quite a few of you during the holiday season. Below is a summary of the greetings we received. I asked alumni to comment on their memories of Greer's Christmas traditions, and quite a few did so in their holiday greetings---their observations are included in these updates.

Karin (Townsend) Hargy reported having gone on a wonderful trip to see Panama and its famous canal. She and husband Don also plan a spring trip to England. Karen continues to attend auctions, garden, knit, play hand and foot canasta and taking walks. Liz Rivera said she was one of the angels in the Martin Play and enjoyed that role. Cherlyn (Gieringer) Luberto says that her and husband Joe survived some scares this year (Cancer and a car accident), but they are both on the mend and well. Dorothy (Schafenacker) McMuntry remembers Christmases at Greer and says at one Christmas Candlelight service, the poor Marcy boys were singing so off key that she felt bad for them, so she stopped playing the organ and let them sing the rest of their carol a cappella. Susie (Murray) Scott visited friends in England and while there, she also visited with former Greer classmate and friend,

Hildi (Walton) Plunkett and her husband. Jack Rolston had the chance to play "Martin" in 1957and said it was a great experience for him to play the role. Roland Herwig told me this was the 49<sup>th</sup> year since he left South Vietnam after serving there. He retired (for real) last August and is enjoying it very much. His wife Cary continues to write and had two novels released in 2017 and continues to write more novels. Gayle (Houser) Fox loved being involved with Greer's Christmas traditions during the two years she was on Greer's staff, and remembers Mr. Fink telling her that if she stayed at Greer for 3 years, she would be at Greer for life as she would love to work at Greer. Armin Ali reports that he and his wife Moona now have 7 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren! He has not been on any cruises lately, but in the past had gone on cruses to the Caribbean and New England and Canada. Armin has also retired for good recently. Svd Nesbitt remembers that Gate House won the Christmas decorating contest during his senior year at Greer- "we went all out" he says. He was also in charge of the Gate House Christmas choir since he was a regular member of Greer's Choir and knew a little about harmony. He had Tom McCandless sing a solo and remembers that it went well. Pat (Jordan) Picco has fond memories of Greer's Christmas traditions. She remembered gathering many boxes of cotton that we could in order to place around the rooms to make it look like snow, and in her senior year, Rapallo won the cottage decorating contest. She played the woman in the shawl in the Martin Play. During Pat's junior and senior years, she stayed at Greer for the Christmas holidays. The presents were nice she says, but the best part was going to Main House for Christmas dinner with the staff. Pauline (Wendt) Kalahele played the part of the angel in the Martin play during her senior year. The Angel appeared at the end of the play after the curtain closed and with the spotlight shining on her, she recited the epilogue which basically, she says, was a synopsis of the birth of Christ. It's funny, Pauline recalls, but after 60+ years, she can still remember her first line in the epilogue. She reports that Louise Manz did the prologue to the play and that Robert Rolston was Martin, and Vera Lee Jones was the mother with the baby. Pauline

said it was an honor to participate in the Martin Play. Bill Monza has such fond memories of Dr. Elliott reading the clockmaker story at our Candlelight Service that he shared the story with the 5-6-year old's he teaches at his church, and last year when he was one of four lay folks asked to give a sermon, he summarized this story as part of the sermon. Hildi pointed out that as each cottage, beginning with the younger ones, went up to hang their pledges and sing their cottage song, the pledge colors were multi-colored, and the circles crept higher and higher up the tree as the older cottages went up to sing their carol. (That was a perceptive observation Hildi!) Alice Austin reports a love for Greer's Christmas traditions, and has great memories of Christmases at Greer with her husband Joe. John Blass managed the lighting in the Martin Play of 1962 and was the voice of God. Anne (Meyrowitz) Foster recently visited Orlando, Florida to support her granddaughter's two days of Cheerleading competition—her group came in second. Anne says it was quite the experience watching the different groups perform as they all were quite good. Frank Cavallito remembers having gotten out of the Army before large numbers of combat troops were sent to Vietnam. He said he was in Fort Hood in the spring of 1965 when people stationed in Fort Benning could expect their next stop to be Vietnam. Bob Jenkins loved Greer's Christmas traditions. Currently, he does substitute teaching in the Buffalo, New York area where he lives and enjoys fishing, bowling, golfing, and doing woodworking projects around the home. Last July, he enjoyed a family reunion in Charlotte, North Carolina, and hoped to visit one his daughters in California.

## Penny Ann Harned Scoggins

Penny attended Greer from 1952-1955 and had a good career at Greer High School as she played all three girls sports, and was also active in the drama club, Glee Club, and Choir. In her senior year she was her class president.

After leaving Greer, she married and had 6 children and has 9 grandchildren and 17 grandchildren at last count. Her work career included 22 years at IBM as a purchasing/procuring agent. She also mentioned doing various functions at an Italian restaurant through the years.

Hobbies and interests include taking care of dogs, reading, crafts and woodworking, and keeping up with her kids' lives.

Some of her memories of Greer include working at plum cottage with the young kids for two years and especially enjoyed her relationship with Plums houseparent, **Miss Sutton.** She said that teacher **Mrs. Freitag** and **Principal John McHenry** were good mentors for her.

Greer's traditions were special, she recalls, and being in the school choir brings back warm memories.

Cottage life, especially her years at Ledge bought stability in her life. Last of all, Penny enjoyed walks around Greer's beautiful campus.

## John Blass

John was a student at Greer in the early 1960's, and after leaving Greer he joined the Navy for four years. His first duty station was in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba in the Ordinance division. Later, he served on the USS Plymouth Rock, an LSD 29 ship for the last three years of his naval service.

After leaving the Navy, John worked in construction for a few years, and later, got a job with a company called, Ingersoll-Rand and eventually got promoted to the position of engineering lab technician.

He went back to school and received a degree in Business Administration and Marketing and Retailing. Later, he earned another degree in Biblical Studies.

After retiring, John became restless and became a driver of a school van for children with special needs. At times, says John, this can be very challenging, but in many ways rewarding.

## **Charmi Neely-Mulvihill**

Charmi attended Greer from 1953-1963. During her high school career at Greer she was very active as she was the Class Secretary for all four years, and she also served in the student council for several of those years. In her junior year, she won the Herbert Bender Loyalty award which was awarded for the student who instilled a sense of loyalty to Greer.

Following graduation from Greer in 1963, she worked for General Electric and then came back to Greer to be a house parent from 1965-1968. In 1968 she began her college career at New Paltz and received a degree in English. She later received her Master's Degree. Following her education, she taught at SUNY and Marist colleges. In addition to teaching, she became a counselor, and worked with people with disabilities. This led her to the University of Wisconsin where she earned a degree in marriage and family counseling. She later went into private practice and this includes mediation work.

Charmi is married and in her leisure time, she enjoys reading (especially history), writing, and hiking with her dog. Charmi's memories of Greer are, like most of us, centered around the holidays of Thanksgiving, the Martin play, and the Candlelight service. Some of the staff who had a strong influence on her were the **Percy's, Warren Olsen, and Gwen Elliott**.
