For the past two years, Sandy and I have gone to the Cedar City homeless shelter one day each week to prepare a meal for those who are in the shelter. Our volunteer work at the shelter has been an eye opener for the both of us. We are constantly thanked by the homeless shelter staff and more importantly, by the homeless residents for our efforts to provide a full meal for them: it sure helps that Sandy is a great cook! These expressions of gratitude make us feel that our service is worthwhile. We cannot come away from our efforts without being grateful ourselves for having good food to eat in our own home and a nice comfortable home to return to each day.

All of us came to Greer because of a need for our parents to have Greer do some of the things they could not do. Some of us who attended Greer came to love Greer, and as well as some who attended Greer who were at the other end of this spectrum in their Greer experience. I suspect most of us were somewhere in between as neither they loved Greer or hated being there but adjusted to the circumstances they were put into and did quite well on a day-to-day basis.

However, no matter what feelings we had about being at Greer, we always had hot food to eat and a warm cottage to return to each evening. This contrast with the uncertainty of how the homeless feel and face each day causes me to appreciate now more than ever the security Greer provided for us during the time we were at Greer, and for that I am so grateful and hope you feel the same way I do.

His wife Bertie had a miniature Schnauzer named Blumpi, and I think she might have had puppies while she lived at Crest Cottage. Noralea and David Abel had horses, and David always wanted to be a cowboy when he grew up. Then there were cows and cats in the Greer School barn. Did I forget any Greer pets? * I do not remember if there were specific rules about keeping pets.

Before I send one of my memories, I wanted to say what a fantastic time Mark and I had at the 2019 reunion where we honored our staff. The Greer School Alumni Reunion Committee did a fantastic job of putting it together. I was in tears when everyone got up and told what teachers, house parents, and other staff had such a positive influence on their life.

I remember when one day Bob Ildefonso, Floyd Oliver and myself went across the Camby Road outside of Gate House and discovered a wild strawberry patch. I think we went back to the cottage to get some containers to put the strawberries in, or we just started picking them and put them in our shirts, which we had removed. I think I ate as many as I picked!!!! Once we had stripped the patch of strawberries, we went back to Gate house and cleaned and mashed all of the berries, thinking we were making strawberry jam, so we could have them for breakfast on our toast. How I sometimes miss those simple days— no cares or worries in the world, and wonderful friends to share them with.

I have never forgotten my days at Greer. When Mark, my partner and I first met 5 years ago and we sat down to dinner at a restaurant and talked, the first thing I told him was about my days at Greer and how to this day I find that it was the best thing that could have happened to me at that point in my life. I truly think that my time at Greer shaped every aspect of my life and my 45 year relationship I had with my former partner and now the one I have with Mark.

When I came to Greer in 1956, I had never played football or even ever had watched a football game. I remembered while at Daisy cottage we would rush outdoors after school and, choose up teams and play some football until it was time to go into the cottage to get ready for dinner. As time passed, Coach Jack Maddox told me he wanted me to play Quarterback. I was shocked and I told him I was too small. He would have nothing of that talk and said, "it's not the size of the dog in the fight, but the size of the fight in the dog." That ended my resistance, and I enjoyed my high school career at that position.

As for my reaction to the Robert Frost poem, "The Road Not Taken," that appeared in the Autumn newsletter, before coming to Greer I had to learn piano and was practicing all of the time it seemed. As I said in a previous newsletter, I had performed at Carnegie Hall and Hunter college as a youngster but gave up practicing once I came to Greer. Greer's music teacher, Dorothy Schafenacker had told my grandmother that she would give me lessons, but I did not make that happen. After leaving Greer, I actually started taking lessons again from my cousin who was the music director for the

Buffalo public schools. I do still have a piano at my home and play it from time to time, but I have often wondered how my life would have been different if I had taken the road to stay with the piano lessons and pursued music as an adult.
