It was 40 years ago that I first became an active member of the Greer School Alumni Association Committee, and I have enjoyed helping to organize our regular reunions in the ensuing years with Jim and Isabel Morton, Doug and Mitzi Berry, Tony and JoAnn Vaz, and Peggy Sparks.

The upcoming reunion on September 20th and 21st is going to be **different** from any of the previous reunions. While the main focus will continue to be on renewing our friendships, an important and unique **additional focus** will be on honoring the faculty and staff who served us so well at Greer.

I have a tremendous sense of gratitude for the staff at Greer who worked long hours for very little pay, and in most cases did an

excellent job to help many of us. We came to Greer because of unusual circumstances in our homes. Many of us were seeking answers to tough questions, and most of the staff did the best they could to give us positive guidance and did it with patience. I am not naïve to suggest Greer was not an effective fit for some of the staff who worked at Greer---you have that in any work environment—but I also remember the many members of Greer's staff who went the extra mile for us, and at this stage of my life, I am so grateful for their genuine concern and caring for me. They provided what my parents could not do for me, and for this reason, I wish to honor them for this priceless gift. Based on my correspondence with so many of you, I surmise many of you concur.

I invite you to come to Greer for our September gathering and join us to express your gratitude to the staff members who guided you in your life. There is, in fact, something very personally empowering when you can express gratitude for those who cared about you and were a positive influence in your life .When you have had someone who cares about you, it has the effect of communicating to you that you

have value as a person and are worthwhile. I cannot even begin to imagine where I would be without the wonderful Greer staff who took me under their wing and took an interest in me. I suspect this applies to most of us.

Profiles of some of Greer's staff that we have received from you.

Mrs Dorothy Schafenacker 1955-1965



Dorothy seemed to be everywhere at Greer. She taught music classes, taught individual's how to play the piano,

played the piano for the music for all the theatrical plays, was in charge of the choir and glee club and played the organ for the services each week in the Chapel-of-the-Child, and helped the Junior YPF and Senior YPF meetings each Sunday evening. The following comments of appreciation concerning Dorothy were received.

From Harry McCandless: She encouraged my participation in Choir, and Harry still wears the cross he won for his choir participation award he received at Greer. She was easy to get along with, and was one of the best choir directors I have ever had, and I have been in choirs all of my life. Last of all, she could explain things very well.

From Diana Munzer: She took a group of us scruffy, awkward kids and had us singing beautiful songs. For example, she taught those in the choir songs they had never heard before. Some were from the Messiah and some were in Latin.

From Penny Klyce: I wrote a hymn and Miss Schafenacker put it to music for me.

From Kristin Beskeen: She taught me to play the piano and I still play it all these years later. She would always take time to chat with me at Greer cottage, and I appreciated her willingness to talk with me.

From Armin Ali: She taught us songs and musical instruments, and my pals were impressed when I would correct them that a saxophone was actually a woodwind instrument, much like the Oboe and bassoon. Not many teenage boys like to sing, but she made us sing the classics that I fondly remember to this day.

From Joseph Delisle: For teachers who had the most profound effect, I'd have to go with Miss Schafenacker. From her got an appreciation for music, especially classical, that has lasted a lifetime. I remember her playing classical music while she read a story, and to this day I cannot hear Scheherazade without thinking about Aladdin and the Arabian Knights. I will always appreciate her dedication and enthusiasm to instill in us love of music.

From John Hudnor: She played us all types of music: Classical, light classical, broadways tunes and had us sing many of these tunes as well as other songs.

My appreciation of all types of music is a credit to her. She also gave piano lessons to students (I believe for free), and I wish I had taken advantage of this. She was just a first-class person!

From Maureen Meyer: I appreciate her introducing all of us to classical music.

Mr. Garold Berry (1950's)

Garold Berry was the Industrial Arts (shop) teacher at Greer and also was the barber at Greer during the 1950's.



From Bob Jenkins: Mr. Berry, as Greer's shop teacher taught me skills that I still incorporate in and out of my home.

From Joe Delisle: Joe said that under the guidance of Mr. Berry, Joe developed a love for wood working, and because of his teaching, I made most of the furniture in my home.

From Doug Berry: My father was not only the shop teacher and school barber, but he took an interest in the students. Unknown to them, he was an advocate for them and made many things happen for them that they were unaware of. Without mentioning any names, he spoke up for them to the administration and became their advocate. He got

along well with the other staff members, knowing that they too wanted to see the students excel. He had a great fondness for Greer and always spoke highly of the school.
