A legacy of service.... Greer's Staff and... You!

Isn't it interesting how we appreciate and see things now that weren't at all apparent at the time they happened. For example, what is now very apparent is the "extra mile" that most of the Greer staff went in giving us extra opportunities to enhance our life at Greer in addition to performing the functions they were hired to do in the first place. All were hired either as houseparents, teachers, administrative staff, or support staff, but it is what most did In addition to their primary function they were hired for which sets them apart as very special people who helped us have the opportunity to further enjoy our Greer experience.

What follows is a list of the staff person and the <u>extra duties</u> that he/she performed:

Pauline Stock-Dance director, and theater; Lois Heller-Modern Dance; Bette Thomas-Girls' Athletic Association; Daniel Simonds-Assistant Football coach; guidance counseling; Gloria Bruno-Cooking club; Mary Cuevas-director, Christmas music show; Gertrude Sutton-knitting and gardening; Mr/Mrs Mac—took very young students into their home; Norman Thompson-assistant football coach; Gwen Elliott-taught Sunday school, sent birthday cards to the students; Ruthann Wichelmann-Brownies, assistant field hockey coach; Ellinor Zishkaucoached field hockey and supervised Greer's cheerleaders: Paul **Schultz**-Assistant bovs' basketball coach; Ellinor Hamilton-Brownies, piano teacher; Jack McHenry-field hockey; Grover Albersassistant boys' basketball coach; Rebecca Button-Glee Club; Ruth Freitag-Science Club; Susan Van Tassell—took class to her farm at the end of the school year for lots of fun and food, President's day

program in school auditorium; Tom Percyexplorers, driver's education, vocational jobs; George Groh- Prom; numerous construction works; Mom Morton-Cub Scouts; Hap Collins-Cub and Boy Scouts; Carmen D'Arpino-theater; Herby Van Anden and Vernon Ladeau-hay rides; Loren Shirar-Art club, fire pit repair and reconstruction and assistant football and boys' basketball coach; Jim Hamilton-Boy Scouts; Dorothy Schafenacker-piano lessons, piano for all plays, choir, Sr/Jr YPF; Rev. Charles Speakman-bike hikes and trip to New London, Connecticut; Joe Fischer-Boy Scouts, Friday night movies projectionist, Midgets' football and baseball teams; Warren Olson-YPF, Red and White, Echo magazine, houseparent relief; Robert Packer, YPF, Class ring advisor; Mrs. Dewese- cub scouts, camp Barbey volunteer; Gerald Berry, School Barber; Mrs. Taylor, girls' sports coach; Philip Van Hook, taught students to run and manage "The Wigwam".

My sources of information on the staff were from yearbooks, the Red and White school newspaper, and from former students expressing appreciation for specific extra duties performed by the staff. Did I miss anybody and the extra-curricular service they performed? I'll bet that I did! Let me know, O.K! They were really good houseparents in the best sense of the phrase.

The one situation I do remember was when coach gathered a bunch of us on the athletic field one day. I was curious, but not frightened or afraid, because I trusted that he had our best interests at heart. That is when he told us that he and Mrs. Fischer were leaving Greer for another job. I cried right there on the ball field as tears came from deep within. In retrospect, I think coach was one of the best, if not the best, male role model I ever had. I think his son **Rick** feels the same about his Dad and I thank Rick for sharing his family's story with us.

It was Peter Guild who attended Greer, and his brother Gerald shared some memories of Peter with us.

Peter had created his own bathtub business which he continued until he retired around 2,000. He met Betty Mills in square dancing, and she was a widow with five adult daughters, and married her in 1996, and as it turned out, they were very good for each other. Peter was very active for several decades in hospice work as a volunteer and won many awards for his efforts. He also worked as a volunteer with "Computers- for- the Blind" that refurbished donated computers for them to help them through their challenges. As a person, Peter was a good listener who gave well-reasoned thoughtful answers back in exchange. In essence, I would describe Peter as a person who helped many others with sage advice as needed and did it gently.

My living at Greer is for me a significant/outstanding moment in memory and also as a turning point for me and set many benchmarks in how and why I have made many decisions about my life. Several staff set these benchmarks to guide me and have become fond memories... essential basics to learn, kindness, and patience. With every reunion, I have enjoyed making friendships that seemed difficult to form when I lived at Greer as I was the son of staff members at Greer.

For me, 13 experiences were the best. They included Friday night movies, walking to the swimming pond with other students, various work assignments and tree planting, learning math from Mr. Cronk, shop from Mr. Sewell, model railroading from Mr. Groh, scouting jamborees with Mr. Hamilton, biking trips for students with my Dad, Mrs. Packer patching me up on some occasions. There was also the first introduction in philosophy given to me by Paul Schultz and singing with Dorothy Schafenacker in the small room upstairs by the gymnasium. I still enjoy some of those songs

today and am passing on singing, piano, and guitar to my grandchildren because of her influence.

I am 76 now and in pretty good health, living in Oshawa, Canada—about 20 minutes north of Toronto- in a ranch style house on the side of a hill in a 1960's subdivision. My weeks are occupied with "honey do" lists and gardening. I also care for 2 grandchildren and introduce them to many things for 2 days each week, so life isn't dull.

My mom grew up in Canada without a father, and was educated as an early childhood educator, and helped set up nursery schools during WWII so mothers could work in factories. After the war she taught in colleges. She ran the "wigwam" while at Greer among other duties she had.

My dad became a top salesman for Lever Brothers, and later, during WWII joined the Canadian Air Force and taught many American and Canadian pilots to navigate across the Atlantic Ocean and deliver supplies to England. These were some of the first flights across the Atlantic Ocean, and proved these flights were possible.

From Bertie Wood, Greer Staff mid-1950's

My husband, Wistar Wood was serving his two years of required military service as a "conscientious objector" because as a good Quaker, he refused to serve in the military. He and I felt that Greer was a very satisfactory substitute for that, and we loved the girls we were the houseparents for. In short, serving at Greer was really a pleasure for us. Little things at Greer were very special for us; for example, I remember one evening when a student went out for a walk alone. She wasn't supposed to do that, so I went to meet her on the road, and we sat down on a bench and talked for a while. Then we came back together, and all was well with her. It was just a little thing, but very satisfying to be sure.
