## Greer as it is in 2014

Come with me on a journey around Greer's campus as it currently looks in **2014**. My walk began at dawn on a beautiful Saturday morning when I left the high school auditorium and departed out the front of the high school entrance. The **pillars** at the front of the high school remain, and have weathered quite well since the last graduation at Greer was held in 1963. Turning right, I walked past the **McAlister House** and found that it is still used as a residence by the retirement community. Next came the **vocational building**, and **Mom Mac's home**, which is now privately owned. However, the vocational center is still owned and used by the Fountains community.

Continuing down **Flint Road** heading toward the staff residence at the **"Southlands,"** I passed the field on the right where **Herby Van Anden** would harvest corn each September in order to keep Greer's dairy herd well fed during the winter months. As I turned right on to the **Camby Road** heading toward the **"Hemlocks,"** I saw and heard the sounds of geese and crows breaking the silence of a Saturday morning. When I arrived on the road leading to the "Hemlocks," which served as the home for the principals of Greer High School (Jack McHenry and Paul Schultz), I was pleased to see the house was just as beautiful as it was fifty years ago, and I remembered this home as being one of the stops on the "progressive suppers," an annual event each September to open up the Young People's Fellowship program for the new school year.

### **Alumni Profiles**

#### Tom King:

Tom was born in New York City and entered Greer in 1943. He remained at Greer until his graduation from Greer in 1955. During his high school years, he served as his class president for one of those years and he was a three sport athlete for all four years of high school.

After leaving Greer, he attended Hunter College in New York City. Next came four years in the Navy, and during this time, he went to Electronics school and while in the Navy, he was stationed in Newport, Rhode Island and also in Europe.

After leaving the Navy, Tom settled in Silver Spring, Maryland with his wife and they raised three children. They now are the grandparents of four grandchildren and even some great grandchildren. During this time he spent 39 years working in an electronics company from which he retired in 1999. He currently enjoys reading and bicycling.

In reflecting on his days at Greer, he especially enjoyed the traditions surrounding Thanksgiving and Christmas. In sports, he vividly remembers the night football game against Chatham High School when Greer won and broke Chatham's four year winning streak. He added that Joe Fischer and Helen Fink were good role models for him. Joe Fischer was subtle, but at the same time very real. Helen Fink was a very nice person and very comforting: especially when he got into trouble. She chose to be helpful--not mean--in guiding one through very tough times.

# **George and Laura Fisher:**

I am combining this profile because both George and Laura attended Greer at the same time, but they did not marry until after they both met at an Alumni Association reunion years after both had been students at Greer. Laura pointed out they did not date while they were students at Greer. George attended Greer from 1937 to 1949. After graduation from Greer, he served in the Air Force with deployments to Alaska and Korea during his time of service. Next, came college at City College of New York and New York University. After college, he was employed by New York Telephone for 5 years. After marrying Laura in 1957, George spent his career in the printing and publishing business until his retirement in 1995. In his retirement, George enjoys painting, reading mysteries, woodworking, and family.

In reflecting back on Greer, one of his favorite memories was Thanksgiving. As for who had an especially lasting influence on George, he cited Ruth Freitag and Herta Taussig. Ms. Taussig went on to become a fairly famous math professor at a Virginia university (Hollins) and had one of the buildings at this university named after her because of her skills and influence on her students.

Laura Fischer attended Greer from 1944-1948. After leaving Greer, she worked for Metropolitan Life Insurance--first in New York City and later in Poughkeepsie after getting married to George. Both are the parents of three children and two grandchildren.

### Pam Pequeno:

Pam was at Greer from 1957 to 1968, and after leaving Greer, she moved to Litchfield, Connecticut. In her career, she was initially in the manufacturing and retailing aspect of the jewelry business and mentioned to me that she worked in the World Trade Center from 1980 to 1988. I am glad Pam was not still working in this center in 2001! Later, Pam was in marketing in the Wall Street area of New York City, and currently she is in the Real Estate Business.

Pam said some of the most memorable events at Greer were the traditions which centered around Thanksgiving and Christmas. I am glad Pam does not remember all the teasing I used to do with her when I was dating her older sister. Pam is still a very nice person who I always look forward to seeing at our gatherings at Greer.
