

I was a Marcy cottage student during the years that Tom was in high school, but since the late 1970's when I joined the Greer School Alumni Association and started helping other alumni to organize reunions, I have gotten to know Tom as he came to virtually every reunion during the subsequent 38 years. At each reunion, I would spend time talking with Tom



and getting to know about his experiences at Greer as well as his post Greer life and family. Through the years, Tom offered many positive suggestions as to how to improve our Alumni Association as he took an interest in what we were trying to accomplish as a

family of Greer Alumni. At the 2016 "Thanksgiving-in-October" celebration weekend, Tom shared an apartment with Sandy and I, which gave us an opportunity to spend much more time-sharing

athletics and academics. Last of all, **John Travlos** did not have as much contact with Tom as the



other classmates in Tom's class because John lived in Rapallo cottage as he and fellow classmate **Jerry Wolf** (pictured above) were house parent assistants who helped supervise the younger students. Nevertheless, John said Tom was a good athlete who did well in his post-Greer life.

While in high school one day, an announcement came to all the high school students that some pigs had broken out of their fences at the farm. Don quickly volunteered to help round up the escaped pigs, and then volunteered his good buddy Jim—what the heck, it got them out of class, thought Jim, and off they went.

The pigs were reported heading down the road that went past the high school, so Don and Jim split up and went off the road circling ahead of the pigs—and got them turned around and headed back toward the farm past the school grounds. As they came to the high school area, Don had one of his questionably brilliant ideas. He wondered if the pigs could be encouraged to go into the high school building!!! **Uh oh!** Undaunted, Don went ahead and opened the door. The pigs hardly hesitated and entered the building: then it got messy! The hallways of the high school were covered in well waxed and polished linoleum. This made the pigs nervous as their legs were slipping out from under them causing more lubricant to be spread about. This was accompanied by loud, high pitched squealing.



There was, Jim reports, punishment to be sure, but for the next 60 years they survived to periodically remember and always have a wonderful laugh about this unusual event at Greer. From Floyd Oliver, 1950's

Floyd worked for American Airlines and after retiring in 2000, he moved to San Diego to pursue his passion for thoroughbred horse racing. He wrote a book entitled, "Breeding by Design" and it

is a best seller in Australia, where horse racing is their number one sport. He is currently working on a second book on racing called "Sire Line Mythology", and in addition, is working on a novel called, "The Power and the Glory." This phrase is from the



Lord's prayer, and the first quarter of the book is about Greer. The first pages of the book are what I remember about August 15th, 1948, which was my first day at Greer. In fact, I recall at the end of the first day, **Miss Sutton** telling me I wasn't going

home and that I was going to become a Greer School boy. I swore to myself that would never happen, but after a couple of years under the tutelage of **Mom Morton**, guess what? I emerged out of Marcy Cottage as a Greer boy: and, I am still one. The book will have a religious connotation, but basically, it is about a Greer child who meets the real world. My intent is to immortalize Greer School, and I hope I can write well enough to accomplish that goal.

Last of all, Floyd has some wonderful memories of life at Camp Barbey. He remembers life in one of the cabins at the camp and remembers being in the cabin with Bob Ildefonso, Mark Parliearos, Larry Von Radics, Ingo Orlamunder, Fenton Keenan, John Hammer, and George Sievers. He would lie in the cabin feeling the cool forest air, looking out at the lantern lights flickering, and hearing the mournful sound of the Whippoorwills.

He also remembers cresting the hill on the road from camp near the cow barn. We would duck under the electric fence and cross the meadow that led to the main campus. As we walked through the tall grass, suddenly a flock of beautiful, Redwinged Blackbirds would rise and fly in all directions. To me these birds were remarkably beautiful. Now that I am getting older, I think back to the delight those birds used to engender in me, and it always puts a smile on my face as it did in those long-ago days. In all the school's campus, there was an atmosphere of quiet peace, and tranquility. I miss that sense of peace...., but it still makes me smile remembering the Garden of Eden in which we were lucky to be raised.

Andy attended Greer from 1960-1962. His parents, Calvin and Dorcus Sewell were on the Greer staff during his time at Greer. Calvin was the Industrial Arts teacher at Greer, and both were house parents at Daisy Cottage. After leaving Greer, Andy graduated from Litchfield (Connecticut) High School in 1969. He then attended the University of Connecticut. Later he settled in to a career as a builder of boats in Maine and then for twenty years in Massachusetts. After moving back to Connecticut, he became a Carpenter, and is a "jack-of-all-trades" in his chosen profession. Today, he continues to do Carpentry work of all sorts.

In reflecting at his time at Greer, Andy mentioned the main thing he remembered was that his parents remembered their associations with the Greer students very positively and spoke often of their time at Greer.
