Hearing from You!

Note: In the recent Autumn issue of the newsletter, we printed half of Pauline (Wendt) Kalahele's (class of 1955) memories of Greer. What follows if the other half of her memories.

I entered Greer's high school in the early 1950's. Greer had a vocational training program for which students were actually paid. My last and favorite job was working in the school office under Mr. Mapledoram Fink, and my most important duty was figuring out the payroll and paying the students. Also, I helped with the student bank where a percentage of the gross amount was saved for the student's future use. Other memories include interscholastic sports for both boys and girls, Friday night movies, walking privileges for the older students on Sunday, hayrides in the fall with Mr. Vern Ladeau hitching up the tractor on a wagon from the farm filled with hay: we had lots of laughs and fun on those hayrides. In the summer, we went swimming in the Rapallo pool if it wasn't polluted. In terms of work, we canned our own vegetables from the farm, and I remember tomatoes, green beans, corn and rhubarb that were first heated up and then we cleaned, canned them, and sealed them for use in the winter months. This was NOT a fun job, and almost everyone complained when their cottage was called upon to help. There was a lot to do at Greer besides schoolwork!!!

I remember sometimes during the week; I would be asked to babysit the two daughters of **Vern and Libby Ladeau** and sometimes for **Mom Mac** when she had a child or two who was too young for Plum cottage. I usually made \$2.00 dollars for two hours work, which was much more than I was paid for the vocational jobs I had.

In sum, I really liked Greer and made lots of friends. It was my home for over 8 years, and I was a happy 18-year-old when I graduated. I would start my first job four days after graduation thanks to **Tony and Victor Vaz's** mother, **Amy Vaz**, and I was on my way to being an adult and on my own.

Roger was the son of Greer Staff members Herby and Sylvia Van Anden. (Herby and Vernon Ladeau ran the Greer School farm.)

Roger remembers that his father was very pleased to have mentored quite a few Greer students who worked for him on the farm and helped them to become fine and productive adults. Herby was so proud of these students.

One of the stories that I would like to share with everyone was the time my Dad and **Vernon Ladeau** raced Greer's two Allis-Chalmers tractors up the barn road to the door of the 2nd story barn hayloft. Dad's tractor slid out the other door of the hayloft with Dad still on it and **the tractor flipped upside down:** fortunately, Dad was not hurt!
