Dear Alumni and Staff:



Theater. The Martin Play. I wonder what happened to the scenery and props. Also the year we presented "A Midsummer Night's Dream." I can still recite my lines.


Assemblies: I remember a chalk and talk on biblical studies.

I. It is with sadness that we announce the passing of two of Greer's former staff members. The first was Vernon Ladeau, 85, on March 01, 2008 after a courageous battle with cancer. Vernon worked for many years at Greer as the farm manager and then as the Head of Greer's maintenance department.





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Vernon's son-in-law, Ken Lilley also passed away in the spring of 2008. Ken also worked on the farm, and Greer's maintenance department.

I knew both of these good men very well as Vernon was still the farm manager during the summer of 1961 when I first worked on Greer's farm and Ken worked on the farm during the last summer that I worked on the farm in 1963. I enjoyed Vernon's fatherly advice that he gave to me as well as his sense of humor; Ken was a hard-working employee who was only a little older than I when we worked together in 1963 and he was a lot of fun to work with on the farm. He must have had some faith in me as he lent me his car to take my driver's license test near the end of that summer in Pawling. Despite being quite nervous before the test, Ken was very reassuring and kept telling me that I would do fine; I was, and his encouragement was of a big help to me.

In retirement, Vernon lived in Connecticut where he enjoyed working around his house (which he built himself) and in being with his family. Ken was working for the town of Millbrook at the time of his passing. I last saw Ken at a gathering at the Herby Van Anden home in the summer of 2006 and we picked up our friendship as if we had just said goodbye at the end of the summer in 1963. The passage of 43 years of time doesn't change great memories of good times

with friends, and in reflection, I am so glad that I was able to renew that friendship with Ken before his passing.


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family. April is tax time and that can be a burden on our travel budget if we have to pay taxes.

There are many con's for October. It




